Tawa Menzshed Workshops.

We have been offered two workshops that members may be interested in taking part in.

1: Chair making

This workshop is a two consecutive weekends at Mangaroa Valley, Upper Hutt using a pole lathe turning green wood, that is wood freshly felled, bending, and assembling. At a later date, probably at our shed, weaving the seat with sea grass. If you are interested and have never done any wood turning before Brian Hawkins is prepared to organise a beginners course on the power lathes in the shed so that you can accomplish basic wood tuning before attempting to use the pole lathe. For an example of the type of chair here is a photograph of one that I made. If you are interested I can show it at the shed one day.

For those of you who have never seen a pole lathe in action here am I trundling away on one making the spindles for my chair.







2. Pyrography.

Graeme McIntyre a member of the Wellington Wood Workers Guild is quite prepared to demonstrate decorating wooden objects by burning a design using a pyrograph tool. This effect is the same as the key ring holders made by Marius except they were mass produced using a laser.

The Container Story

In early 2017 when Tawa Menzshed was a being but without a shed we were offered, free of charge, a container. Three of us went to view this gift which at the time was full of furniture and covered with a tarpaulin. I assumed that there was a small leak or two which we could easily fix but then the container arrived minus its furniture and tarpaulin but plus hundreds of holes in the roof and some in the sides



What a shock and what are we going to do?. We talked to a Container dealer who said it was the worst container he had ever seen and offered to sell us a second hand one for \$2,000.00, which we did not have. He suggested that we could get it taken away for free and maybe even get some money for it as scrap. So we then thought about it for awhile, shall we keep it and cover up the holes with a steel roof or a tarpaulin?. In the mean time we were given a load of deck joists which we put in the container out of the way butunfortunately not to keep them dry.

Finally this year we made the decision to cover the roof with second hand corrugated iron which **Smartway Builders** will contribute and use the deck joists, after de nailing, as the timer plate and rafters for the roof so that when complete we can store most of the timber which is gradually filling up the shed. But we need help as we need at least four members to cut and install the roof timbers and probably the same amount to fix the roofing iron.

So folks how about it and maybe then we could give the old container a lick of paint. Jack Fry 232 2594 🖵

This is really the best option if things really going "pear shaped" but you need access to the Defibrilation machine. This unit while it looks quite daunting, when in use it speaks to you with very explicit instructions - it will not give the electric shock if it detects its not necessary.



I think we should have a session at the Menzshed – its almost 100% certain we will have an occasion at some stage in the future to need to use this knowledge and maybe the Defibrillation m/c







Community Pantry

The Menzshed was approached earlier this year to see if we could construct a community pantry for excess produce from the Community Garden in Oxford Street. An outline plan and photo was provided as an example of what was envisaged. Brian Smith produced a design maximising the use of standard size materials to reduce waste and cost. A grant was obtained from the Community Garden via a Community Grant and Brian Frampton of ITM Tawa generously donated some of the materials.

To enable most work to be undertaken in the Shed, the construction is in two parts - a base which was installed on site (photo) and the upper pantry portion which is then fitted onto the base when complete (photo). Shed members contributed knowledge, experience and time to produce the completed unit which is about to be installed on site outside the Tawa Central Kindergarten. It's rumoured that the children will decorate the outside.

The MenzShed Tawa (MZT) and the Friends of the Tawa Bush Reserves (FOTBR) Collaboration (Gary Beecroft)

FOTBR's plant propagation operation generates approximately 500 trees per annum from locally eco-sourced seed, for planting in Tawa's bush reserves. The current propagation facility at Tawa College will soon be una-vailable. The FOTBR approached the MZT and the WCC to consider collaborative use of the land beside the MZT. Both committees supported the community groups operating in collaboration as neighbours, and the WCC agreed.

In the new year the FOTBR will finish clearing the site, then erect a Greenhouse (7M X 2.4M) and two shade houses (8M X 3M), on the site pictured below. It is hoped that both organisations will be able to help each other with construction, fitout, and funding from external sources. The collaboration will further extend the important positive attitude of Tawa Community groups involvement and support for the people of Tawa.



Friends of the Tawa Bush Reserves

Andre has organised with members of the "Tawa Menzshed" and for "Friends of the Tawa Bush Reserves" to repair a seat somewhere off Peterhouse Street in Tawa. As can been seen by the photo the seat part is pretty far gone. It will probably need to have the wood replaced - just the sort of job the Menzshed like to get stuck into.





There is a need for some additional new supervisors, particularly to cover the new opening day of Thursday and other gaps as they arise as a few of the original supervisors are no longer able to do this.
