# A Joint Effort.....

On 21 March 2021, Rachael Millar, one of Tawa's St Francis Xavier School Grants' Officers and Teacher Aide visited our MenZshed to ask if we could build three Picnic tables for the children aged around 5 to 7 years old.

Rachael had some pictures of a picnic table the school wanted, built by a North American builder.

So in taking on this community request, we had to consider a few requirements of the build.

Did we have the manpower to commit to the project and did it conflict with any other projects currently being undertaken? Then there was the material necessary for the table. We decided not use Radiata Pine because the H3.1 pines; suitable for outdoor furniture could be hazardous (I.E. it contains copper chromium **arsenic** (CCA)). Fortunately Bunnings stocked Kwila an Indonesian hardwood used extensively for decking and although more expensive than the pine, it was perfect for use with children.

On March 22 we provided Rachael with the price for the job using Kwila and stainless screw fasteners. Her grant application with Hutt Mana Charitable Trust was successful and she advised us on May 22 when we started the build.

Jim, Bryan and I bought the timber and started designing the table so that all fasteners (screws and bolts) would not be visible on the table top or seats.

A proto type table was completed and on 24 June 2021 and Rachael was invited back to the shed to check out the prototype. **She liked it**.

More material was purchased from Bunnings and the second and third tables were started.

The project was pleasurable to complete, but due to the weather and other school commitments, all three tables weren't delivered to the school till 12 August 2021.



WE are proud of the finished products and the team effort to build the tables as was the school, Feedback from Rachael confirmed that the school was pleased with the result and from the faces on the children and excitement of using them for their lunch, we are proud to have been part of a successful community project.

## Machine Tool Gurus or Experts

Your Shed now has a number of quite sophisticated modern machine tools in addition to some quite serviceable older machines, which somehow have escaped from the local museum for retired tools.

What has become evident is that the complexity of the newer machine tools, and the foibles of some of the older tools, creates the opportunity for less experienced members to misuse these tools, leading in some cases to damage to the machines, which then causes an inconvenience to other members wishing to use them.

Your committee has decided that each machine deemed to be "complex" is to have a "guru" or expert, assisted by one or two deputies, to be responsible for certifying individual members' competence to operate each of the designated machines, to be responsible for training and ongoing maintenance.

To that end we need volunteers for these roles. We know that many of our members do indeed have expertise in each of these machines. We don't necessarily know who they are. So if that's you, please let Jack know and he will add you to the team.

The current list of candidate tools is: Band Saw, Compound Saw, Drill Press, Grizzly Saw, Morticer, Planer, Router Table, Stop Saw and Thicknesser. Know stuff about any of these machines? Then your Shed needs YOU!

To be a minder or deputy you need to have a good working knowledge of the machine and capable of doing minor adjustments, there are instruction books for most of the machines in the filing cabinet in the room upstairs. Other wise use Google or ask people like Andre, Brian, Nick or myself.
