Hutt Mana Charitable Trust Supports the Tawa Men's Shed with a grant to purchase a new router table and cutting bits

The **Hutt Mana Charitable Trust**'s objective is to build a strong and sustainable community and environment. They give in excess of \$600,000 every year to support groups like the tawa MenzShed and we are very grateful for their generosity.

One of the goals of the MenzShed Tawa is the availability of quality wood working facilities which are used by women and men in Tawa and surrounding areas to undertake a wide range of personal and community projects. The Shed also hosts facilities for **Tawa College Community Education** and the **Guild of Woodworkers Wellington**. One of the key elements of our ongoing development as a vibrant community asset is accommodating the aspirations of people of all ages in developing their woodworking skills.

Unsurprisingly, one of the most popular machines in our repertoire, for both new and experienced woodworkers, is the table router. Because we have such a diverse range of skills using the router table, we have required commercial grade router table to meet our organisation's needs, and the **Hutt Mana Charitable Trust** has supported us in this new purchase.

Wood Turning Workshop at the Shed - Run by Guild of Woodworkers Wellington

An enjoyable recollection of a very recent Wood Turning Workshop from **Ruth Pirie** On a very cold Saturday morning in June, six students turned up to the Tawa Menzshed to start a 4 day woodturning workshop. Some of us had no experience at woodturning (my only prior experience was making a paper towel holder in a woodworking night class in my 20s) while others owned their own lathes and tools.

Our tutor, Mark Wilkins, from the Wellington Woodworking Guild showed endless patience and helpfulness in keeping us on bevel and cutting not scraping. I learnt how sharpen tools, correct tool angles, the right lathe speed and the correct height and positioning of the tool rest all contributed to a good result. Or more importantly, these things prevented a really bad result. I now know why the shed has those net partitions between the lathes - beware the flying bowl. After 4 days of woodturning lessons, each of us ended up with a seed dibber, an egg cup, a honey dipper (one of us half finished theirs) and a bowl.

Thank you to Mark and Mike (volunteer assistant tutor, supplier of finishing oils and good humour) and Mark's wife for the delicious scones.

Thank you also to the Tawa Menzshed for allowing us to hold the workshop alongside the regular Sat/Sun workshop sessions in June. Are you a thrillseeker?

A friend asked me this question the other day. I was surprised – surely I'm nobody's idea of a swashbuckling adventuresome thrillseeker! Why ask the question? "Well", they said "you spend a lot of time using dangerous equipment every week. It's surely a lot more perilous than what you used to do!"

That got me thinking. I did some internet browsing (yes, I know that can be risky). The general consensus is that the most dangerous woodworking tool is the table saw. Various lists also include circular saws, chain saws, bandsaws, nail guns, drill presses and power drills, angle grinders, jointers, routers and ladders. I use most of those guite often!

I did some calculations: some of those saws have the potential to hurtle material back at us at over 200 km/ hour. I'd rather not be in the way of that!

So – what to do? A quick refresh on the basics:

- Wear personal protective equipment (PPE). Safety glasses, ear defenders, no loose clothing. OK, that's the first line of defence sorted.
- Read the manual yes, really. Good information can keep us safe.
- Use the right tool for the job. For example, just because we can make just about any sort of cut on a table saw (there's some crazy stuff on YouTube) doesn't mean we should!
- Keep our tools in good order. It doesn't take long to check the blade before using it...
- Keep the work area clean and tidy before and after.
- Keep hands and fingers (all fleshy bits, as one of my sons says) away from blades.
- Use clamps, push sticks and other guides to stay in control of the work.

We were able to purchase these with the aid of a generous grant from Hutt Mana Charitable Trust. Our Chairman Gary Beecroft attended the presentation to our Menzshed of the grant



On the left Graeme C. has assembled the Meccano like table, made a temporary storage box for "extra bits", on the right Graeme is doing some final adj before installing into the table.







On the left can be seen the set of cutting tools and the profiles that can be produced - they are quite substantial in size so great care should be taken when using this powerful unit.

Below is the completed, installed unit, we are arranging to hold some training and familiarisation sessions with small groups



Extracts from Safety and User guide we hav produced - this can be obtained in digital or printed form.

It's recommended when using this m/c to wear Earmuffs, Protection glasses, Mask.

Safety, Safety, Safety, Safety First and Safety Last.

Users should find it with unit raised fully, without any cutter or insert disk. Switched Off at wall and maybe the plug out on table. I can then start safely from scratch.

More importantly this would mean the switch mounted on router would be OFF and plastic guard closed over switch. You cannot raise this unit all the way up to change the cutter without switching it off and having plastic guard over switch.

The fine height control is adjusted by winding the handle to raise or lower the router gradually. The handle sticks slightly when lifting the router so do not force it!


Changing router bit

- 1. Turn off the switch at the rear right of the machine and slide the safety guard over the switch
- 2. Free the height lock (if required) and raise the router to the maximum height. The collet should be above the table. If not, the safety guard may not be closed.
- 3. The collet is self-locking so only one spanner is required to loosen or tighten the collet.
- 4. The bit should be inserted at least 20mm (or half the shaft length) which ever is greater. The bits which came with the router have an index mark on the shaft these should be inserted up to the mark. Tighten the collet.
- 5. The correctly sized reducing ring should be used for the bit.
- 6. Lower the router to free the guard over the switch.
