
Group (Margeret Herbert). The paint was donated by P&Z Resene's Porirua.

- b) the same really applies to the combination locks, when opening the gates or door, please close the lock and scrable the numbers, of course same applies when you lock up.

We're trying to stave off the inevitable, and somehow keep him going as long as we can.

A couple of weeks ago he fell down the stairs (even though he *knows* that he can't do stairs) and now he's been left unable to walk. If he could manage a doggie wheelchair/cart thingy then life might become bearable for him.

His front legs are largely useless, but his back ones can step ok. But also he doesn't have any balance.

Most doggie carts are made for dogs whose rear legs don't function. We've bought one such cart, but at the moment the only way it can work is for two of us to hold it up while he walks, one at the front and one at the back – and it's very tiring on our backs!!
