Are we being Square ?

A woodworker recently suggested the mitre joint I had just made; was not square. Yes it can happen.

In this instance, he was checking it with an adjustable (or combination) square he had taken off the rack in our Menzshed. Hence, it seemed wise to check the tool.

You can do this, by using said Square and drawing a line perpendicular to an edge you know is straight. Turn the tool over, & just cover up that line, then draw another line. The 2 lines drawn on this occasion were about 3 mm apart at the end, so the tool was faulty. I have even bought a new one that was out of square. They can be rectified to true them up. We could learn how to do this, when we run one of our short tool skill sessions.



Modifications to our benches

Some discussion has been had at committee level and elsewhere regarding our work benches and improvements that can be made. Some ideas were put forward by Gary B and JohnG took up the challenge to implement one change and to promote thought AND action for other members to carry out some of these improvements.

So.....

1. Flat work surface. Two(?) of the benches currently have partial inserts to make them partially flat. Messy, because cleaning the gap between the inserts is difficult and they are not easily removed. We should fabricate a complete full length insert and make it easily removable.

2. The side clamping slot is a sound idea, but needs to be only part way along the side of the bench so as not to obstruct the vice. Unless some clever clogs has a better idea? I have a partially considered idea but it may not work??

3. Supporting peg holes in the legs. Once again. interference between the potentially long work piece and the vice needs further thought. Also the nature of the pegs and pins needs to be carefully considered so they aren't too tight or too sloppy and maintain an appropriate 90° angle to the vertical.

4. Mounting the plunge (rail?) saw. I believe we could design an alternative insert for the flat work surface (1 above) that could be slotted in to any of our work benches when required. This insert would have the rail (with extension) securely mounted and make provision for secure clamping of the workpiece thereon. Possibly this could be an adjunct to, or integrated with, the side clamping slot (2 above).

Start scratching the grey matter folks.

What a journey......

Id like to share some of my experience of trying what is for me a tricky job. This was supposed to be a quick repair for a friend - my first thought when I offered help was to just make a solid round disk and whack that in. We have all the equipment to make a replacement top - its just that I have no experience really of using all that gear and I think I used most of our tools available to me.

I thought how hard can it be? I soon found out and I have learned some valuble lessons for the future.





This is what I started with

I did lots of measuring (and spent lots time) to get the corrct angles then found out when I got to the combo drop saw the angle is already built in (22.5degrees for eight pieces)





Graeme C helped me round off the outside - not an easy job for a left hander, then we rounded off the top edge I had great fun using toothpicks for dowels locking in the slats this is where my not so accurate cutting showed up with the gaps between not so even as I wanted





Time to put it in its housing, this was now all glued up and ready for staining with Teak Oil - another learning curve, Im just left with mounting the top to the base and we are ready for cocktails.
